

ESWWDA Fall Meeting

October 13, 2023

President Dave Rosick called the fall meeting of the *Empire State Water Well Drillers' Association* to order at 5:15 pm on October 13, 2023, with 27 members in attendance or via Zoom. President Rosick thanked the Root family, Root Contracting and Dave Chugg for hosting the fall meeting. Adrienne Boyd sold the 50/50 tickets.

Alan Dretel made a motion to wave the reading of the minutes as they appeared in *Hole Talk*. The motion was seconded by Chris Root, and the motion carried.

At this time the treasurer's report was read by Julie Boyd. Chuck Crover was later on zoom and had no additions. Reports are available upon request. Chris Root made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report as read. The motion was seconded by William Frey and passed unanimously.

President Rosick thanked everyone for coming and taking the time out of their busy schedule. He reported that Leise's rig had been found and thanked members for their assistance. President Rosick mentioned a rig which caught on fire in Vermont and reminded members to make sure they are insured for replacement cost. It was also noted that Governor Hochul had signed into legislation a bill to allow geothermal drilling below 500 feet. Kevin Moravec will be speaking about this shortly.

Communications: No communications to report.

Sickness & Health: William Frey was present but had a broken toe from a catwalk falling on his foot. Our condolences went out to the family of **Tim Utter** who passed away October 13, 2023.

Insurance & Safety: Analisa Bastiani-Jesco was unable to attend but sent a report in advance. She is currently working with Chuck and Julie on two classes for the Annual meeting. She also wanted the General Membership to be aware that Workers Compensation rates for Drilling are going down 4.60% and Plumbing rates are going down 5.4%. This is a positive indication that Workers Compensation premiums will be going down for the drillers for the upcoming renewals. The one variable that can change this is each member's **Experience Mod**. The Experience Mods for each member may go up or down depending on their loss history and will also affect their renewal pricing. We continue to stress the importance of having all members apply for the NYS Construction Credit. We see this credit range from as low as 3% to as high as 25%. We are here to help all members apply for this credit.

Membership: Sue Bates reported that we have a total of 284 members with no new members this quarter. We have 245 paid members and 39 unpaid. Invoices for 2024 will go out after the fall meeting.

Scholarship: The Board has one application for review. It will be tabled until the next Board meeting.

Government Affairs: Jeremy Baldwin reported ESWWDA is at the table at meetings regarding any future changes.

NEWWA: The next **Expo** will be **March 8-9, 2024**, in Marlborough, MA.

Budget & Finance: No report at this time.

Education: Henry Boyd reported that we will be doing the General Drilling and Pump Installer Premier at the annual meeting with a full slate of other classes.

NGWA: Art Becker sent a letter which stated that he had inquired with NGWA about the PSI exam scheduling as discussed at the ESWWDA summer meeting. PSI testing locations (over 400 locations nationwide) are PSI owned testing centers or subcontracted testing centers. The number of computers/ test stations varies from location to location and therefore the number of people able to sit for a test on any one day varies from location to location. It is possible to schedule and take more than one NGWA exam in a day if the PSI testing facility is large enough to accommodate the number of people requesting exam times on that day. Remember PSI provides exams for many vocations besides

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well drilling. I would think the well drilling exams are one of PSI's smaller revenue streams because of a smaller amount of exams given based upon fewer nationwide well drillers.

Kristen Frederick is the Certification Manager at NGWA and after speaking with her she has offered her assistance to anyone who is having trouble setting up exam schedules and/or needing information to study for the tests. NGWA is in full recognition of the need for a more comprehensive study guide and is working on this effort. Please provide Kristen's contact information to those ESWWDA members in need of assistance with exam scheduling. Kristen is more than willing to help and is very dedicated to her position at NGWA. Kristen Frederick can be reached at 800-551-7379 ext. 1526 or Kfrederick@ngwa.org.

Jeremy Baldwin reminded members that the NGWA Expo would be in Las Vegas December 5-7, 2023, and the classes looked interesting. Any member attending should contact Sue Bates to be added to the delegates list. Also, we hope everyone reads the three-page article in the Water Well Journal on Frey Well Drilling.

WSC: No report at this time.

Hole Talk: The deadline for the next issue is **November 1st**. For those planning ahead, the next deadline will be **February 1st**.

Public Information: Sue Bates asks the membership to look at the new website. It is more user friendly on phones and other handheld devices. Please let her know if you have any ideas or questions.

DOT: Jim Utter reported they are out. He also made contact with **Sergeant Kidder**, and we will reach out to him as a speaker in the future. DEC have been doing sniff tests on some groups such as loggers.

Continuing Education: Affidavit and accreditation points will be due this year with membership renewal.

Geothermal: Kevin Moravec informed the membership that on September 21, Governor Hochul signed a chapter amendment to allow geothermal drilling past 500 feet without the additional requirements required by DEC Division of Mining. Though there will be some type of regulations with this, it will need to be developed such as a geo completion report. Our first concern is health and safety. It did not change the definition of geothermal. It is still under the Division of Mining since it is not like water well drilling. So, all the details will still need to be worked through and there are multiple people at the table including us. The gas and propane industries have a lawsuit against NYS proposed renewal energy mandates. On the positive note we are working with the utilities to make an incentive program for the borehole as well as the geothermal equipment. The drilling needs to be valued so we are trying to incentivize the industry. NYSERTA is looking at a cost compression model which would require us to lower our prices. There will be more venture capitalists in the industry trying to buy up equipment and companies. By 2025 no new home can be built with fossil fuel and by 2032 we can not replace any fossil fuel run equipment. Henry Boyd said that he spoke to Senator Harckham who proposed the change regarding the health, safety and water quality concerns the drilling industry has.

Veterans Program: The third of the three proposed jobs have been completed. Special thank you to everyone who helped make this a success. Remember it will be auction time soon at the **Annual meeting**.

Past Presidents: No report at this time.

Old Business: Sue Bates reminded everyone that the Annual meeting will be January 16-17, 2024, at the Shenandoah Lodge at Turning Stone Casino.

New Business: President Rosick appointed Alan Dretel, Jeremy Baldwin, and Jim Dwyer as the nominating committee. Sue Bates reported that the spring meeting will be in Kingston April 19-20, 2024. She is looking at the Schroon Lake or Lake George area for the summer meeting.

Dan Boyd was the winner of the 50/50 drawing for \$111.

At this time **Dave Root** made a motion to adjourn the meeting. **Jeremy Baldwin** seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 6:33 pm.




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With the rain that some of us had this fall, the following is a good reminder regarding overflowing wells.

Flowing Wells

Flowing wells are water wells from which water flows under natural pressure without the use of a pump. Flowing wells occur in many locations across New York State, as shown on the map below. The discharge rate for uncontrolled flowing wells can range from a few drips an hour to over 1,000 gallons per minute (1.4 million gallons per day). A flow of just 5 gallons per minute will waste over 2.6 million gallons of water in a year.



Complications Arising from Uncontrolled Flowing Wells

When flowing wells are not controlled they waste our precious groundwater resource and can damage the surrounding environment in a number of ways.

- The water supply of the aquifer is reduced, potentially affecting wells miles away.
- Area water quality and aquatic habitat may be harmed. For example, if cold groundwater flows into to a stream, lake, or river, the habitat of warm water aquatic species may be impacted. Turbidity or water chemistry may be altered by the infusion of groundwater carrying high volumes of sediment.
- Water spilling over the outside of the casing of a flowing well may cause surface soil erosion, subsurface voids, and localized flooding. It is also possible for rocks

and sediment to erupt during a breakout or blowout and create unstable and hazardous conditions near the well. The result could be damage to the land, the well, and structures.

Controlling Flowing Wells

These undesirable impacts can be avoided by controlling the flowing well. NYS Department of Health Standards for Water Wells require that flowing wells be constructed, equipped, and operated to control the rate of discharge. Well control may be accomplished by adding a few feet of well casing to the top of the well or by following other standard well drilling industry practices to stop the flow while maintaining its use. For general information of flowing wells, see the Flowing Well Handbook (PDF), published by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality by clicking on the link on DEC webpage. Owners of flowing wells should enlist the aid of a DEC registered well driller to ensure the proper operation of groundwater wells. DEC regulations address the damage caused by uncontrolled flowing wells, including:

- 6 NYCRR Part 608 Use and Protection of Waters
- Part 661 Tidal Wetlands Land Use Regulations
- Part 663 Freshwater Wetlands Permit Requirements
- Part 750 State Pollution Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) Permits
- Subpart 646-4 Stormwater Management

BOREHOLE 500'+ COMPLETION REPORT

October 18, 2023 - Governor Hochul signed the bill into law that allows for changes to drilling regulations for closed-loop geothermal boreholes deeper than 500 feet which NY-GEO recognizes is a very high priority for our industry.

Recognizing a number of us would like to commence with the design and install boreholes deeper than 500 feet, we would like to provide some background and guidance going forward.


The 500 feet geothermal drilling law exempts closed-loop geothermal boreholes deeper than 500 feet from the oil and gas regulations they were previously subject to. However, before the Governor signed the bill into law, she reached an agreement with the legislature to give DEC authority to create new, appropriate regulations for closed-loop geothermal boreholes deeper than 500 feet. NY-GEO has been working with the DEC in establishing these regulations.

While DEC develops the new regulations, NY-GEO has committed to the Governor's office and DEC that as an industry association, we will act in good faith and strongly encourage industry members to abide by the following NY-GEO guidance until the rulemaking process is completed:

Until the new regulations for deeper closed-loop geothermal are implemented (likely sometime in late 2024), Geothermal Drillers are asked to voluntarily submit a Geothermal Borehole Information Form (Form) to NY-GEO starting October 20, 2023.

- Geothermal Drillers will submit this Form to NY-GEO only for closed-loop boreholes deeper than 500 feet.
- NY-GEO will maintain this information in a database and make the information available to the DEC.
- This information will help in the development of appropriate regulations for deeper closed-loop geothermal boreholes.
- This will also lend continuity to the recordkeeping of deeper boreholes prior to new regulations taking effect.
- Information provided to NY-GEO on these forms will be made available to the public, upon request.

Note - the only geothermal technology addressed in the new law is closed-loop. Open loop boreholes and any other geothermal technology deeper than 500 feet are still subject to the previous regulations. The form is linked above and can be found on the **NY-GEO site here**. More current information will be available at our annual meeting.



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The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

Charging an E-bike

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.





General Drilling and Pump Installer Classes

Will Be Offered at the Annual Meeting, Tuesday, January 16, 2024

At the Annual meeting of the Empire State Water Well Drillers' Association, we will be offering classes.

Preregistration is required one week in advance and classes must have a minimum attendance or classes will be cancelled. Registration deadline is January 5th.

The first part of the class will cover general drilling knowledge, which will assist individuals in taking the Drilling General Exam and some questions on the General Water Systems Exam.

The second part of the class will cover more of the Water Systems General and the Pumps under 100 gpm exam for pump installers. Please note exams are not given on-site. There will be no Cable Tool or Rotary Classes. You must schedule for the test on your own and in advance.

Completion of this class and general hands-on experience will enable you to prepare for the required NGWA exams. Licensing for any person operating a drill rig or performing pump work is a DEC requirement.

Class size will be limited. Registration will be \$75 for ESWWDA members and \$150 for non-members. Any member, who has already taken any of the primer classes offered in 2002 through 2023, may retake the class for \$40. Payment can be made with cash, check or credit card (MasterCard or Visa). Onsite check-in begins at 8:30 am.

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Law ECL §15-1525 requires the following:

- Water well drillers and pump contractors must be registered with the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation.
- After a well is drilled, contractors must provide a DEC well completion report to the well owner.
- At least one certified individual must be on site during well construction, pump installation or repair to either.
- Water wells must be constructed in accordance with NYS Department of Health rules and regulations (link leaves DEC website).
- Water well drillers and pump contractors are subject to General Business Law 36-A, which regulates home improvements.
- The NYS Health Department has Fact Sheets on Protection of Water Wells (*link leaves DEC website*)


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

Services were held at Coltrain Funeral home on November 12th. Burial will be private at a later date.






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Scholarship Money Available

Albert H. Mack Scholarship Guidelines

Guidelines for the establishment of the scholarship fund and awarding of scholarship monies for ESWWDA:

A. Scholarship Fund

- 1. Maximum funds available in one calendar year: \$2,500.
- 2. One thousand dollars per year to be set aside until the fund reaches \$7,500.

B. Awarding of Scholarships

- 1. Preference to be given to sons or daughters of association members.
- 2. Preference to be given to students attending 2-year programs.
- Scholarships available only to persons whose course of study is related to the water well industry.
- Persons may make application to the scholarship committee only after acceptance at an accredited school, offering a program related to the water well industry.
- 5. Funds may be distributed to more than one person in any one calendar year.

Daniel M. Shultes Scholarship Fund Guidelines

This scholarship is a one-time award to children of Contractor members in good standing who are attending college in a field of study outside the industry or areas not covered by the <u>Al Mack Scholarship</u>.

Awarding of Scholarships

- Preference to be given to children of Full Contractor members
- Preference to be given to students attending minimum of a 2-year program
- Persons may make applications to the scholarship committee only after acceptance at an accredited school.
- Funds may be distributed to more than one person in any one calendar year.
- Application deadline is April 1st of each year.
- Applicants are selected via a blind selection process.
- The number of scholarships and the amount of the scholarship are at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee and cannot exceed a total of \$1000 per calendar year.


